November 1, 2020 The Solemnity of All Saints



#### Dear Parish Family:

Today, we celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints. On Monday, the Feast of All Souls, we offer our prayers and Mass intentions for those who have left this world and have not yet reached heaven on account of sin.

"The Holy Souls are eager for the prayers of the faithful which can gain indulgences for them.

Their intercession is powerful. Pray unceasingly. We must empty Purgatory!"

~Saint Padre Pio

Coming to us from scripture and tradition, we know that there is a heaven, there is a hell, and there is a purgatory. All three conditions are very distinct possibilities for each and every one of us. "Purgatory is like a purifying fire burning inside a person, a painful experience of regret for one's sins… A soul stained by sin cannot present itself to God." Pope Emeritus Benedict. He also said about "purgatory" in a talk dedicated to the life and mystical writings of

St. Catherine of Genoa. "St Catherine was a 15th-century married woman who ran Genoa's largest hospital. Married at age 16 to an older man with a gambling problem, she initially lived a very worldly life; but after about 10 years, she was struck by the emptiness of her life, especially in comparison to the greatness of God's love. She began a life of purification, which, for a long time, made her experience constant pain for the sins she committed and pushed her to impose penances and sacrifices on herself to demonstrate her love to God. Although she is the author of a Treatise on Purgatory, she never received specific revelations about purgatory or the souls that are being purified there. Rather, her deep prayer and focus on the conflict between human sin and God's love led her to understand how logically a person who has sinned would not be worthy to be in the presence of an all-loving, all-perfect God." Pope Benedict continued, "Unlike most Catholics of her day, Catherine was convinced purgatory was not a place, but a process... adding that suffering is purgatory." "The soul that is aware of the immense love and perfect justice of God consequently suffers for not having responded correctly and perfectly to that love."

I encourage everyone to attend Mass tomorrow for all our beloved dead. Masses will be celebrated at 8:00 am, 12:05 pm and at 6:30 pm.

Consider offering Mass intentions throughout the year for your loved ones. What better way to show your love for those who have died than to offer the holy sacrifice of the Mass for their soul. So enroll them in Masses this year even if they have died long ago. Let us use this month of November, a month traditionally dedicated to the Holy Souls, to build up the practice of offering regular prayers and sacrifices for those who have gone before us in faith. Let our prayers for them be our tribute of faith and love for all that they gave to us in life. Remember, too, to make a habit of praying for *the forgotten souls*—those who have no one left to offer prayer and sacrifice on their behalf.

## Beatitudes, As Promises



The beatitudes which Jesus proclaimed are promises. In the biblical tradition, the beatitude is a literary genre which always involves some good news, a 'gospel', which culminates in a promise. Therefore, the beatitudes are not only moral exhortations whose observance foresees in due time — ordinarily in the next life — a reward or a situation of future happiness.

Rather, the blessedness of which the beatitudes speak consists in the fulfilment of a promise made to all those who allow themselves to be guided by the requirements of truth, justice and love. In the eyes of the world, those who trust in God and His promises often appear naïve or far from reality. Yet Jesus tells them that not only in the next life, but already in this life, they will discover that they are children of God, and that God has always been, and ever will be, completely on their side.

They will understand that they are not alone, because He is on the side of those committed to truth, justice and love. Jesus, the revelation of the Father's love, does not hesitate to offer Himself in self-sacrifice. Once we accept Jesus Christ, God and man, we have the joyful experience of an immense gift: the sharing of God's own life, the life of grace, the pledge of a fully blessed existence.

Jesus Christ, in particular, grants us true peace, which is born of the trusting encounter of man with God.









## **Purgatory**

## "Scripture and Tradition clearly spell out the need for most to undergo purification after death."

We all have Catholic family members and friends who say purgatory does not exist and that the Church no longer teaches it. Several of them insist that their priest told them this. It's sad, but true: That any Catholic today, especially a priest, would say that purgatory does not exist is lamentable. Purgatory is a dogma of the Faith, consistently taught and believed through every age of the Church. It is set forth clearly in the Catechism of the Catholic Church (#1030-1032). Scripture sets forth the need and fact of some sort of purifying process for most. Jesus promises that when his work is complete, we will be perfect as the heavenly Father is perfect (Mt 5:48). Scripture attests that nothing imperfect or impure shall enter heaven (Rv 21:27). Yet most of us will admit that godlike perfection is rarely observed in those who die, even the very pious. Though I can reasonably conclude I love God and am not aware of mortal sin on my soul, I am far from godly perfection. For this reason, the Catechism states: "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. ... The tradition of the Church, by reference to certain texts of Scripture, speaks of a cleansing fire" (CCC, #1030-1031). Thus, St. Paul teaches that our works will all be revealed and tested by fire. And some of our works, though built on the foundation of Christ (i.e., not conceived in mortal sin), are ignoble, they will be burned away, but the pure works will bring reward. And though the builder will suffer loss, he yet will be saved — though only as one escaping through the flames (1 Cor 3:15). Thus, some sort of purgation after death is taught by Scripture, which also lays the foundation of the need for it. Further, instinct of the faithful to pray for the dead and solemn teaching authority of the Church also testify to the truth that purgation (and, thus, Purgatory) is a needed gift of the Lord to us.

#### **OUR NEED FOR PURGATORY**

November is a month traditionally given over to remembering the dead. Called The Month of the Holy Souls, we're supposed to increase in our efforts to offer prayer and sacrifice for all those who have died. Scripture tells us that it is a good and holy thought to pray for the dead, and to offer sacrifice on their behalf. Our prayers and sacrifices, joined intimately to the sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross, brings them the forgiveness of their sins.

Most of us who are baptized into Christ do not live perfect lives, and we do not arrive at death's door with the fullness of Christ formed in us. This is where Purgatory comes in. The word "Purgatory" does not appear in the New Testament, but the idea is present in three fundamental convictions of Catholicism. These are: that God wills the salvation of all men and women; that God does not cut off from salvation those who die in imperfection; and finally, therefore, the process of salvation continues after death.

Heaven is not a reward for doing good; it is the state of being in Christ. Purgatory is the process of being fully conformed to Christ after death. Purgatory should not be seen as a divine punishment for sin, but as God's work of bringing us to the Christlike state. Jesus' death on the cross and His Resurrection and exaltation broke the hold of human sin not only for the living but also for the dead. To deny the existence of a purgatorial state is to condemn the dead forever to separation from Christ (which, of course, is what hell means).

Not everything in Catholic doctrine is found fully expressed in the Bible. But there is a process called "the development of doctrine." This means that as the Church reflects in time over fundamental convictions of the faith, it formulates in a clear and decisive manners beliefs that follow from the logic of the faith. This is how it was with the doctrine of purgatory. As a side note: Don't confuse Purgatory —a revealed Doctrine of the Faith —with Limbo. Limbo, according to the ideas of some theologians, is "natural state" where there is neither suffering, nor the presence of God. Be clear, Limbo never was part of Catholic Doctrine, but was the opinion of theologians.

Does the candidate recognize traditional marriage and family as the central social institutions that must be supported?



Does the candidate recognize that every person has a fundamental right to life and to those things required for human decency, including food, water, shelter, employment and health care?



Does the candidate embrace all those in greatest need who deserve our preferential concerns, such as children, the disabled, the elderly, refugees, the unemployed and the poor?

Does the candidate recognize policies that promote basic rights for workers, such as fair wages, workplace safety, collective bargaining, and the right to private property and economic initiatives?



Does the candidate recognize that whatever our national, racial, ethnic or ideological differences, we are all our brothers' and sisters' keepers? We must all work to create unity through dialogue and a civil discourse that is respectful to others.

**Bulletin submissions** are to be submitted **no later than 8 days preceding** requested publication date. Notices and full page flyers will run for a maximum of two weeks, and priority will be given to items that are date sensitive. If possible, all items should be typed for legibility and accuracy and dropped off at the Parish Center or sent via e-mail to

#### **BAPTISMS**

The sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:15 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

#### **WEDDINGS**

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

#### **ANOINTING OF THE SICK**

If you or someone you know is in need of this Sacrament, please contact the Parish Center at any time. Upon admission to the hospital, please make it known you.

#### IF YOU ARE HOSPITALIZED...

If you or a family member are admitted to the hospital, please contact the Parish Center to let us know. Due to federal regulations, most hospitals will not contact parishes unless you specifically request it. We want to visit parishioners in the hospital, but are often unaware of their hospitalization.

#### **FRIDAY COMMUNION CALLS**

Communion calls are made every Friday for those unable to attend Sunday mass due to health issues.

If it is too difficult for you to walk to the front of the church to receive Communion, please know that at each Mass an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion comes to the back of the church to distribute Communion. If you would like to have the Extraordinary Minister give you communion in the back of church, please let an usher know

before Mass begins. At Communion time, when you see the Extraordinary Minister come to the back, please raise your hand so that they can see you and give you Holy Communion.


