

From the Pastor

Dear Parish Family:

October is a beautiful month, dedicated to the Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and also is observed throughout our country as Respect Life Month. Let us pray the rosary this month for an end to abortion. The scourge of abortion is a grave sin against life itself, the most precious gift from God.

Many of our political leaders enact laws that seem to further erode our rights and liberties as Americans. They show just how many leaders in government do not protect the sanctity of human life, but instead look for ways that do not protect innocent life. Many of these leaders seek to promote and pass more laws to kill human beings from the moment of conception right up to the moment of natural birth. Many of these leaders seek to promote euthanasia instead of being on the side of defending the elderly and the vulnerable who cannot defend themselves. Their agenda is to kill individuals who are no longer productive and rather present financial burdens. We live in a society that promotes a culture of death, not a culture of life. And, if we do not put a stop to it through our obligation to vote this November, we risk having many more laws enacted that will help erode the way of living we hold dear as Americans. This includes the proposal to defund the police and those who protect and serve to preserve justice and peace. The scourge of hate within our streets, the killing of police and innocent citizens, no matter what race, the killing of the innocent and those who are defenseless is a tragic situation we find ourselves in. We have the opportunity this November to vote with a prayerful conscience guided by the Holy Spirit, scripture and the teachings of the Church.

I'm grateful to Nancy Magnus, our parish Pro-life coordinator, and those who help her to keep the sanctity of life issues before us. Saint Mother Theresa of Calcutta said: "I feel that the greatest destroyer of peace today is abortion, because Jesus said, 'If you receive a little child, you receive me." So every abortion is the denial of receiving Jesus, the neglect of receiving Jesus. It is really a war against the child, a direct killing of the innocent child. During this Respect Life Month do what you can to better understand and give witness to the Church's consistent and deeply rooted teaching on the sanctity of human life from the moment of conception until natural death. Our Catholic stance on life begins with conception. Without respect for life at its beginning all of the other issues pertaining to respect for life easily fade and fall away. Let's pray and ask Mary — The Mother of Life — to pray with us and for us that we may be courageous in our witness to life!

Last Saturday evening, the priests and select members of the laity gathered together as representatives of the Eastern DuPage Deanery. Together we met for an evening Mass at Immaculate Conception Parish in Elmhurst to welcome Bishop Ronald Hicks as the sixth bishop of the Diocese. I'm sure you join me in enthusiastically welcoming our new Bishop, and offering our prayers and support as he begins his episcopal ministry as the head of the Diocese of Joliet. 

Although not yet resuming regular meetings, the Women's Club is again assisting with the Our Lady of Angels Mission Christmas stocking project.


As in the past, we are collecting stocking stuffers to be donated to support the project.

Jesus compares the kingdom of heaven to a wedding feast

Matthew 22:1-14

Immediately after criticizing the religious leaders through the parable of the tenants in last Sunday's Gospel, Jesus proceeded to tell another parable, again directed at the religious leaders. We hear this parable in today's Gospel.

In the parable of the wedding feast, Jesus offers an image of the kingdom of heaven using the symbol of a wedding banquet. In today's first reading from the prophet Isaiah and in today's psalm, the Lord's goodness is evident in the symbol of a feast of good food and wine. Jesus' listeners would have been familiar with the image of a wedding feast as a symbol for God's salvation. They would consider themselves to be the invited guests. Keeping this in mind helps us to understand the critique Jesus makes with this parable. The context for this parable is the growing tension between Jesus and the Jewish religious leaders in Jerusalem. This has been the case for the past two Sundays and will continue to be true for the next several weeks.

The parable Jesus tells is straightforward. The king dispatches his servants to invite the guests to the wedding feast that he is planning for his son. The listeners would have been surprised to learn that the first guests refused the invitation. Who would refuse the king's invitation? A second dispatch of servants follows. Again to the listeners' great surprise, some guests ignore the invitation. Some of the invited guests even go so far as to mistreat and kill the servants. The king invokes his retribution against these murderers by destroying them and burning their city.

We might stop here for a moment. Why would some guests kill the servants sent to invite them to the king's wedding feast? It might be possible that the king was a tyrant, evidenced by the destruction of the city of those who refused his invitation. But if we follow this idea, then the allegory seems to be about something other than the kingdom of heaven. It is more likely that the destruction of the city would have been a powerful image corresponding to the destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans in A.D. 70, which would have been an important event for Matthew's audience.

With the invited guests now deemed unworthy to attend the king's wedding feast, the servants are sent to invite whomever they can find. The guests arrive, but it appears that accepting the king's invitation brings certain obligations. The guest who failed to dress in the appropriate wedding attire is cast out of the feast. We are reminded that while many are invited to the kingdom of heaven, not all are able to meet its requirements. God invites us to his feast, giving us his salvation. Yet he asks us to repent for our sins.

Jesus' message in the parable cautions against exclusive beliefs about the kingdom of heaven. The parable also teaches about humility. Those who assume that they are the invited guests may find that they have refused the invitation, and so others are invited in their place. To accept the invitation is also to accept its obligations. God wants our full conversion in complete acceptance of his mercy.

A Prayer for our Nation's Election

O God, we acknowledge You today as Lord, not only of individuals, but of nations and governments.

We thank You for the privilege of being able to organize ourselves politically and of knowing that political loyalty does not have to mean disloyalty to You.

We thank You for Your law, which our Founding Fathers acknowledged and recognized as higher than any human law. We thank You for the opportunity that this election year puts before us, to exercise our solemn duty not only to vote, but to influence countless others to vote, And to vote correctly.

Lord, we pray that Your people may be awakened.

Let them realize that while politics is not their salvation, their response to You requires that they be politically active.

Awaken Your people to know that they are not called to be a sect fleeing the world but rather a community of faith renewing the world.

Awaken them that the same hands lifted up to You in prayer are the hands that pull the lever in the voting booth;

That the same eyes that read Your Word are the eyes that read the names on the ballot,
and that they do not cease to be Christians when they enter the voting booth.

Awaken Your people to a commitment to justice, to the sanctity of marriage and the family, to the dignity of each individual human life, and to the truth that human rights begin when human lives begin, and not one moment later.

Lord, we rejoice today that we are citizens of Your kingdom. May that make us all the more committed to being faithful citizens on earth.

We ask this through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

BAPTISMS

The sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:15 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.


